Brain and Mind in Borderline and Related Conditions

Borderline Personality Disorder (BPD) is a diagnostic entity with a wide diversity of clinical manifestations that often overlap with the features of other personality and mood disorders. Dr. Stone will describe the various ways BPD presents in clinical practice and review its complex etiology, including both environmental and genetic factors. A PowerPoint presentation will illustrate the neurological changes observed in patients with BPD and will compare and contrast them with the neuroanatomical features of patients with related conditions. The presentation will be followed by discussion and a social gathering.

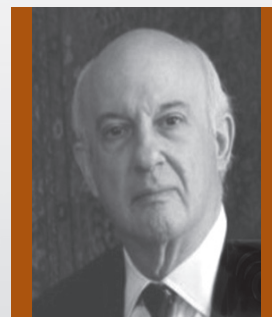
