Course Description

The beginning stages of treatment are extremely important to the process of analysis and both analyst and patient are in a condition of significant unknowns. From the very first contact the potential patient makes and through the early sessions significant issues and elements of how the treatment will unfold are present and will offer opportunity for examination and understanding. Recognition of early patterns of resistance and the inductions that they engender is important to understand and deal with. Verbal and non-verbal cues and interventions that arise during this period will be studied in order to discover and uncover ways to work effectively in establishing treatment objectives and treatment strategies. Students will be expected to do the readings weekly and write up a short reaction report and personal log that will be sent via email prior to the next class meeting.

Objectives

Students will be able to:

- Describe the concepts underlying the modern psychoanalytic approach to beginning treatment;
- Recognize and identify resistive processes;
- Examine techniques of resistance resolution;
- Examine transference phenomenon and distinguish differences of levels along the continuum of narcissistic to object transferences;
- Examine feeling states in the analyst with respect to induction and countertransference; and
- Identify techniques for dealing with resistance patterns.

Method of Evaluation

Class participation, attendance, logs, and completion of written assignments.
