

Spring 2025 Semester Registration Information

Semester Course Schedule

The Spring 2025 semester begins January 27, 2025; classes end May 8. See calendar on page 6. **All classes will be conducted at 16 W. 10**th **Street.** Students are expected to attend class on campus.

Registration

Students register for classes and supervision sections online using Blackbaud's student portal beginning January 2. As always, completion of registration is contingent upon having obtained the Advisor's or Fellow's approval and upon submitting the PT 7 form digitally signed by the approved training analyst.

A \$150 late fee will be charged for tuition processed after January 17, 2025. Students log in to the Blackbaud student portal at https://cmps.mycampus-app.com/ to indicate the courses and supervisions they wish to take. This function becomes live on July 1. When students have indicated their course and supervision preferences online, they email the Registrar (registrar@cmps.edu) to let him know they are ready to pay tuition. Extended payment plans are available.

Registration is finalized only if tuition and the completed PT 7 form are submitted, and if all previously borrowed materials have been returned to the library. Certificate and Research Candidates must be current with their monthly room reports in order to complete registration. Course credit is not given for semester work unless everything has been properly submitted.

The \$100 registration fee covers library services, journal subscription, Center ID card, and all Center mailings.

Leave of Absence

Students who are unable to register for the semester but who wish to maintain their enrolled status send an email requesting a leave of absence to their academic Advisor *and* the Registrar explaining why they are electing to take a leave. They register for MM Maintaining Matriculation and pay the \$100 Maintaining Matriculation fee to ensure all Center mailings, journal, and library use (except for PEP privileges). Students on leave of absence continue in PT 7.

PT 7 / PT 8 Analyst Statement

The PT 7 form, signed by the training analyst(s) and returned with the registration form every semester, confirms that the student is in the required weekly analysis and tracks the number of sessions since the previous PT 7 was submitted. New students use this special PT 7 form. It is the student's responsibility to report any interruptions in analysis or change in the frequency of sessions to the Advisor or Fellow. Students in group analysis submit the analogous PT 8 form.

Advisement Orientation Group

This group orients students to all aspects of the training process and facilitates getting to know one another outside of class to forge mutually supportive relationships. First-year students are encouraged to attend. The group meets Tuesdays, 5:30 to 6:30 PM, and is free of charge.

Assigned Readings

Most classes have a reading assignment every week, including for the first class meeting of the semester; students are expected to have read all the selections assigned for every class. The CMPS faculty uses the Blackbaud Education Management System to post syllabi and readings not available in PEP (and for a variety of other tasks). Consequently, in order to be able to fully participate in class, every student needs access to Blackbaud.

Library Access

When the library is open, the copier may be used to photocopy assigned readings. Students establish an account and set up a numerical password with the librarian in order to use the machines.

Work/Study Program

Students wishing tuition assistance may apply for a Work/Study internship with the Registrar, Mr. Guttman. Candidates are paid at an hourly rate. A limited number of positions are available.

Advancing from Level I to Level II: Beginning clinical training at the Consultation and Referral Service

Level I students who have completed all fourteen Level I required courses may submit their Application for Certificate Candidacy to their Advisor. (Some of the requirements may be in the process of being completed in the semester when the application is submitted.) The Advisor reviews and evaluates the application. Once the application is approved, the Advisor helps the student select the appropriate courses for the first semester at the Referral Service, including PT 2610 or PT 2611; PT 490 TBD (Fellow to be determined), a weekly 20- or 30-minute meeting; and PT 211i TBD (clinical supervisor to be determined), a weekly 50-minute meeting. Before the start of the semester, the Administrative and Clinical Directors of the Referral Service hold an orientation meeting for new Certificate Candidates to familiarize them with the administrative responsibilities pertaining to working with patients at the Referral Service. At the start of the semester, a Fellow is assigned, replacing the Advisor.

Accelerated option for Level I students

Level I students may apply for an abbreviated path to getting clinical experience working with patients at the Consultation and Referral Service. This pathway was introduced to accommodate Level I students who would find their classroom experience enriched by beginning clinical work earlier in their training.

As noted above, Level I students are ordinarily required to complete all fourteen Level I courses before advancing to the Referral Service and Level II, Certificate Candidacy. The accelerated option allows students to students to apply for approval to begin working with patients at the Referral Service after completing 100 hours of personal analysis and the following seven courses:

- PT 141 Human Development: How the Mind Unfolds, Part 1
- PT 142 Human Development: How the Mind Unfolds, Part 2
- PT 151a Basic Psychoanalytic Theory, Part 1
- PT 161 History of Libido Theory in Freud
- PT 162 History of Drive Theory in Freud
- PT 187a Critical Observation and Psychoanalytic Listening, Part 1
- PT 187b Critical Observation and Psychoanalytic Listening, Part 2

The remaining seven Level I courses remain requirements to attain Level II (Certificate Candidacy):

- PT 154a Comparative Psychoanalysis, Part 1
- PT 154b Comparative Psychoanalysis, Part 2
- PT 155 Dream, Fantasy, and Symbolic Communications
- PT 171 Systematic Investigations and Ethics in the Human Sciences
- PT 172 Psychoanalytic Research and Ethics
- PT 181 Somatic Factors: The Biology of Mind and Behavior
- PT 184 Primitive Mental States

Students interested in this abbreviated pathway to gaining clinical experience should be aware of the following:

- The decision as to whether this option is appropriate for you should emerge from a discussion with your academic Advisor about how you would manage the added responsibilities and program requirements of being a therapist at the Referral Service.
- If your advisor agrees that the accelerated pathway is a good fit for you, submit the <u>Application for Level I Clinical Experience</u>, to your academic Advisor. It is understood that the application may include courses you are currenty taking. Your Advisor will review and evaluate your application.

- If you have met the minimum requirement of 100 hours of individual analysis and have completed the requisite seven courses, and if your Advisor approves your application, you may advance to the Referral Service while remaining a Level I student.
- The Advisor will help you select the appropriate courses for your first semester at the Referral Service. In addition to choosing from the remaining Level I required courses, you will also register for PT 2610 or PT 2611; PT 490 TBD (Fellow to be determined), a weekly 20- or 30-minute meeting; and PT 211i TBD (clinical supervisor to be determined), a weekly 50-minute meeting. Course selections should be made so as to not conflict with the Referral Service day preferences indicated on your application. Before the start of the semester, the Administrative and Clinical Directors of the Referral Service hold an orientation meeting to familiarize you with the administrative responsibilities pertaining to working with patients at the Referral Service. At the start of the semester, your Fellow will contact you to set up your first weekly meeting. From that point on, your Fellow will be your academic advisor. When you have completed all Level I required courses, your Fellow will inform the Registrar that you have met the requirements for Certificate Candidacy. No further paperwork will be needed to advance to Level II.

Curriculum for Research Candidates

Until their final semester, Research Candidates (Level III students) pay a minimum total in tuition and fees of \$1775 per semester: \$750 for six 50-minute sessions of **PT 527** Directed Research, \$400 for **PT 2612** Seminar in Clinical Practice, Psychopathology, and Psychodiagnosis III, \$525 for **PT 490** Referral Service Semiannual Lab Fee, and \$100 for the registration fee. When the PT527 Research Supervisor determines that the final paper is ready for approval, the Research Candidate pays \$390 for the Research Reading Fee (**RF 101**). This covers the cost of final approval of the paper by the second and third readers, two members of the Research Committee other than the Research Supervisor.

Referral Service:

All Referral Service students consult their Fellows and the <u>Referral Service manual</u> for instructions about the appropriate sequence of courses and clinical supervision. Candidates assigned Center referrals have all their cases supervised in **PT 211***i* Beginning Supervision of Consultation and Referral Service Cases, **PT 411** Control Analysis of a Consultation and Referral Service Case, and/or **PT 611** Small Group Supervision of Referral Service Cases. (PT 611 is a supplement to PT 311—not an alternative to it.) In order to receive credit for their supervision hours, candidates register for all their supervision in Blackbaud.

Referral Service students also register for PT 490 Referral Service Lab. The Referral Service Lab fee is \$475 for each of the first two semseters. Beginning their third semester at the Referral Service, the fee is \$525 per semester. The fee covers five scheduled referrals, weekly consultation with the Fellow, and telephone answering service.

Graduation requirements regarding supervision

CMPS graduation requirements specify a minimum of 200 hours of *individual* supervision with 3 different supervisors. This can be accomplished in two ways: (1) 50 hours of PT 211i, a minimum of 100 hours of PT 311 with a different supervisor, and a minimum of 50 hours of PT 411 with a third supervisor; OR (2) 50 hours of PT 211i and at least 50 additional hours of PT 311 with the same supervisor, at least 50 hours of PT 311 with a different supervisor, and a minimum of 50 hours of PT 411 with a third supervisor. The PT 7 individual analyst or PT 8 group analyst may not serve as a supervisor.

- Students who entered the Referral Service prior to Fall 2019 may comply with supervision requirements for graduation from their entry bulletin.
- Candidates with larger caseloads who need additional supervision may add one or more PT 311 supervisors or enroll in PT 611, but PT 611, as small *group* supervision, does not fulfill any graduation requirement.
 - All Certificate and Research Candidates remain in supervision until graduation.

Note: Four semesters total of PT 2610 or PT 2611 is the minimum requirement to complete Level II. All Level II candidates enroll in either PT 2610 or PT 2611 every semester until Level III is attained.

- PT 311 Supervision of Consultation and Referral Service Cases Prerequisite: Fellow approval. Minimum requirement: 50 sessions with one supervisor.
- PT 411 Control Analysis of a Consultation and Referral Service Case Prerequisite: Fellow approval. Minimum requirement: 50 sessions with one supervisor.

Required courses for students at at Level III, Research Candidacy, each semester until graduation:

(Students who have completed the above coursework and a minimum of 25 hours and one year of PT 411, and who have made a clinical presentation to the faculty)

- PT 311 Supervision of Consultation and Referral Service Cases
- PT 411 Control Analysis of a Consultation and Referral Service Case
- PT 2612 Seminar in Clinical Practice, Psychopathology, and Psychodiagnosis III. Research candidates enroll in PT 2612 every semester until graduation.
- PT 527 Research Supervision/Ethics Taken at least once every semester until approval of the final paper.

Note: In accordance with New York State requirements for licensure in psychoanalysis, CMPS graduation requirements include 45 clock hours of research.

- · Students who completed Level I at CMPS have met this requirement.
- Students who completed PT 171 and PT 172 before enrolling in CMPS meet this requirement by taking PT 522 (30 clock hours) at Level II and a minimum of 15 clock hours of PT 527 (6 clock hours) at Level III.


