


Emancipated Woman or Femme Fatale— Bizet's Carmen

his multi-media lecture examines Carmen, the first operatic archetypical Femme Fatale who was dismissed by contemporary critics as a "prostitute of the gutter," a "wild animal," and a "cynical harlot." The lecture explores several relevant questions: Can Carmen be diagnosed as a Malignant Narcissist or is she the early embodiment of the modern, sexually emancipated woman? Is Carmen's lover Don José what psychologists call "Narcissistic food?" Is Carmen an appealing predator or a victim? Does the audience experience what Aristotle described as "a purging of the spirit of morbid and base ideas or emotions by witnessing the playing out of such emotions or ideas on stage"
