To Have and to Hold The World of the Compulsive Hoarder

N AN OVERVIEW of hoarding behavior, we will examine the neuropsychiatric aspects and deficits of hoarders, the beliefs commonly held, and the diagnostic categories in which hoarding

may be a factor. We will view the video "My Mother's Garden," which provides an in-depth look into the psychic world of a hoarder and her family, and her reactions to their attempts to help her. We will consider the psychic solutions sought in hoarding behavior, and will conclude with brief case presentations of patients in treatment for hoarding. The Modern Psychoanalytic techniques of joining the resistance, utilizing emotional communication, and analyzing the narcissistic transference will be discussed.
