PEP - Finding specific journal articles


If you already have an article citation, such as from a class syllabus, this is a simple way to retrieve the full article (you first need to log into PEP):

- > On PEP homepage, choose Search tab
- > In Author field, enter author's last name (optionally, add first initial of first name)
- > In Title field, enter a couple of words from the article title
- Click Search button
- Click on the citation to get the full article

Example:

Mitrani, J. L. (1995). Toward an understanding of unmentalized experience.

Psychoanalytic Quarterly, 64, 68-112.



Troubleshooting


Following are tips for some common issues. You can always ask the librarian for help in searching or in getting any material not available on PEP (<u>librarian@cmps.edu</u>).

If you're unable to pull up the citation you need:

> Are you certain the journal is covered in PEP? Check the Journals tab:



- Double-check spelling, especially of author names, and look for typos. PEP, unlike Google, will not correct for these.
- ➤ Your original citation may have errors. Try entering fewer words only one word in the title field, for example, rather than several. You can also search on one field alone, such as author, or use different search combinations. The following example searches by author name and limits results to a specific journal, as chosen from the Source dropdown menu:




If you're finding a citation in PEP, but can't pull up the full article:

> Are you definitely logged in? On the homepage, you should be seeing "Logout":



➤ Is the article recent? PEP generally includes the full text of articles from about five years ago or older; more recent articles will show only an abstract or opening paragraph:



➢ It's possible that the full article actually consists of an abstract. Psychoanalytic Quarterly, for example, publishes abstracts of articles that have appeared in other journals. The following shows an abstract of an article from the Canadian Journal of Psychoanalysis. This is the full article (an abstract) as it appears in Psychoanalytic Quarterly; the article it's discussing, from the Canadian Journal, may or may not be included full text in PEP:
